A Heartbreaking Loss for Fort Mill Schools



Tragedy struck in February when Stanley Brucker, a 61-year-old crossing guard for Fort Mill's elementary and middle schools, was fatally struck by a vehicle during afternoon dismissal. Despite immediate medical attention, Brucker succumbed to his injuries. In response, the school district emphasized the importance of safety in school zones and made counseling services available for students and staff.

Tega Cay Ranks as South Carolina's Top Community In brighter news, Tega Cay was crowned the best place to raise a family in South Carolina by Niche.com's 2024 rankings. The city's A+ rated schools, familyfriendly atmosphere, and strong housing market contributed to its recognition as a premier destination for families. Nestled along the shores of Lake Wylie, Tega Cay also earned accolades as the best place to live

in both the state and the Charlotte metro area.

Celebrating Athletic Excellence



Fort Mill High School's sports teams had a standout year, with both triumphs and challenges. The girls' and boys' cross-country teams won the 5A state championships, and the girls' swim team won their 3rd consecutive state title.

Meanwhile, the boys' soccer team brought home the state 5A title after a dramatic match against Stratford High School. Following a 2-2 tie in regulation and a two-hour weather delay, the Yellow Jackets prevailed with a 3-0 victory in penalty kicks, capping off a memorable season.

Tega Cay's entrepreneurial spirit shone brightly with the opening of the Tega Cay Coffee Company's new storefront and the launch of an ACE Hardware store by longtime residents Ryan and Carmen Carroll. Honoring a Local Hero







Former South Carolina Congressman John Spratt Dies at 82 *Thomas Hyslip, Editor*



John Spratt, a longtime Democratic congressman who represented South Carolina's 5th Congressional District for 28 years and was instrumental in crafting key national legislation, passed away Saturday night at the age of 82. His daughter, Catherine Spratt, confirmed that he died at home surrounded by family, due to complications from Parkinson's disease, which he had battled for more than a decade.

Spratt represented a district that includes Tega Cay, Fort Mill, and a broad swath of northern South Carolina. First elected in 1983, he became one of the most influential lawmakers in Washington, respected for his expertise in budget matters and his ability to work across party lines. Spratt played a leading role in passing the Balanced Budget Act of 1997, which helped reduce the federal deficit, and he introduced the Affordable Care Act on the House floor, significantly shaping healthcare reform.

Born in Charlotte, North Carolina, Spratt grew up in York County, South Carolina. His father established both a law firm and the Bank of Fort Mill, where Spratt practiced law and served as chairman. In addition to his legal and political career, Spratt ran an insurance agency and operated a farm in Fort Mill, maintaining strong ties to his community.

Spratt's death has prompted an outpouring of tributes from across the political spectrum, with state officials announcing plans to lower flags to half-staff on the day of his funeral to honor his contributions. Leaders from both sides have highlighted his unmatched intellect and dedication to serving South Carolina and the nation.

Spratt is survived by his wife, Jane Stacy Spratt; three daughters, Susan Elizabeth Spratt (David Tendler), Sarah Stacy Spratt (Brian Brennan), and Catherine Bratton Spratt; as well as several grandchildren. South Carolina Considers Medicaid Work Requirements Under McMaster Directive *Patrick Byrne, Editor*



COLUMBIA, S.C. — South Carolinians receiving Medicaid benefits may soon face new work requirements to maintain their coverage, following a directive from Governor Henry McMaster to the state's Department of Health and Human Services (SCDHHS). The department has been instructed to prepare a formal request to implement the mandate once President-elect Donald Trump takes office.

Revisiting Work Mandates During the first Trump administration, South Carolina gained approval to enforce Medicaid work requirements, but the policy never took effect due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Biden administration subsequently barred states from imposing such mandates.

McMaster argues the policy is necessary to ensure fairness and accountability, targeting able-bodied adults aged 19 to 64 who are not disabled. If approved, approximately 200,000 South Carolinians would be required to work at least 80 hours per month, participate in job training, pursue education, or volunteer to maintain Medicaid benefits.



Under a previously approved waiver, certain individuals were exempt from these requirements, including:

Supplemental Security Income (SSI) or Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) recipients;


Primary caregivers of children or disabled adults; Medically frail individuals; Pregnant individuals or those within 365 days postpartum; Those residing in areas with unemployment rates of 8% or higher. The proposed policy would also exempt those in Medicaid-covered substance abuse treatment programs and members of federally recognized tribes. Additional exemptions for the new request are still under review, according to the governor's office.

Critics, such as Sue Berkowitz, policy director for the SC Appleseed Legal Justice Center, caution that these requirements could create undue burdens for Medicaid recipients.

Berkowitz also expressed concern about logistical challenges, such as lack of transportation or administrative barriers, which could lead to coverage loss for some beneficiaries.

Balancing Accountability and Support Supporters argue that the policy encourages personal responsibility and reduces reliance on public assistance. Opponents warn that it risks penalizing vulnerable individuals who face systemic challenges in securing employment.

As South Carolina finalizes its proposal, the state will revisit the exemptions and consider feedback to balance accountability with support for low-income residents. If approved, the state will become one of the few to enforce Medicaid work requirements in recent years.

Healthy Living with Dr. Hall: Pickleball Injury Prevention Tips Dr. David Hall



Pickleball combines restrained low-level volleys with sudden highlevel salvos. This can provide terrific athletic challenges and great health benefits. Activities like pickleball support cardiovascular fitness, muscle tone, bone density, balance, coordination and agility. Here are some tips to help avoid injury and keep you in top pickle performance.

CLOTHING

Loose fitting (but not baggy) clothes allow optimal joint movement and blood circulation, helping to diminish muscle fatigue and cramping. Clothes made of fabrics that have 'wicking' properties are best. They quickly move sweat to its outer surface to dry rapidly, preventing saturation of your clothes and keeping you cool and comfortable.

SHOES

Whether you're playing outdoors or indoors, surface-appropriate shoes are a must. A court-type shoe is also important as running shoes are designed to go in one direction (forward) and provide little lateral support. The shoe should be low to the ground yet be able to absorb shock, minimizing stress on your knees, ankles and feet. The shoe should also fit well to prevent blisters and other foot pains. When's the last time you actually had your feet measured?

PADDLES

Grip is the most important part of a pickleball paddle. A too-small grip requires you to squeeze the handle too tightly, causing fatigue which may lead to tendonitis. A too-big grip makes it difficult to hold onto and to change hand positions. Shake hands with your paddle. Your finger and thumb should be about a finger's width apart. Ultimately, the best grip size is one that is just large enough to play with comfortably and allows for a full range of motion. The handle should be cushioned to absorb shock but remember that a handle wrap will affect the overall grip size.

COURT

Newer courts are typically best. They have fresh lines and no cracks or 'slick' spots from wear. Check for debris and make sure you're comfortable with playing on that 'almost dry' court. If you're playing in the late afternoon, turn on the lights a few minutes before you think you need to. And remember it's always nice to be on a court that has some nearby shade to take a break in.

GET GOING!

Before performing any physically challenging activity (pickleball / yardwork / pumpkin chuckin') always ready your body by emulating the activity. For pickleball, walk forward then sideways. Look up, down, all around. Stretch up and down. Bend over, sideways and twist. Start the warmup slowly increasing in intensity until you are breathing a bit harder and maybe breaking a slight sweat. If you're afraid this will make you look silly, do it at home just before leaving for the court. Frankly, I'd rather look silly than nurse my injury from the sidelines.

DRINK UP

Water is a healthier choice than sports drinks. Water is what your body craves most when physically stressed. Unless you're playing for a long time in the heat and humidity, your body can do without the added sugar, caffeine, etc. that most sports drinks are loaded with. Your body actually has to use more water to push that stuff out of your system than it absorbs.

BEGINNER'S LUCK

If you're new to the sport, take a lesson or three. There is great value in learning the proper way to do anything – including pickleball. Good form will help you play better, have more fun and avoid injury.

JUST IN CASE

Even with the best preventive measures pain and injury can happen. 

Insulate Pipes: Pipe insulation costs as little as 50 cents per foot and can help avoid expensive repairs.

Keep Garage Doors Closed:

Especially if water lines run through the garage.

Open Cabinet Doors: Allow warm air to circulate around pipes under sinks, but remove any harmful chemicals if you have children.

Let Faucets Drip: Running water, even a trickle, can prevent freezing.

Maintain Indoor Temperature:

Keep your thermostat at a consistent temperature, day and night, to avoid pipe freeze-ups.

When Away: Leave the heat on and set it to at least 55°F.

Seal and Insulate: Add insulation to attics and basements, and seal cracks around windows and doors to reduce drafts.

in college but it wasn't until his junior year that he felt an overwhelming desire to pursue his dream of being an actor.

Although he had no previous acting experience, Manny took a leap of faith, moving to Los Angeles in 2019. He signed up for his first acting class shortly thereafter. "I feel like when you grow up somewhere, people know you for what you are, " said Manny. "Moving away gave me that freedom to escape everything that everyone knew me for. If I embarrassed myself, I embarrassed myself. I was ok with it."

Six months after moving to LA, COVID hit, putting a dent in his plans to fast track his acting career. "That changed things pretty quickly for me. It was a ghost town."


Rather than move back home and give up on his dream shortly after it started, Manny decided to learn screen writing. If he couldn't find any opportunities, he figured he'd make his own. He began writing short films, often creating a character for himself, which allowed him to work on his acting skills. These are roles he's written for himself in the past and is comfortable playing. He mentioned his character "really explores the gray area of morality" and "how far you're willing to go to protect those you love or those you've been hired to protect."

Homestead also stars Neal McDonaugh and Dawn Olivieri, both well known actors who were recently featured in the hit TV series Yellowstone.

This is certainly a big break but it's just the beginning of what is blossoming into a successful career. Manny has also been cast in a new Marvel production (although he wasn't at liberty to share the details). Regardless, when you hear Marvel, you know it has the potential to be huge.

Manny hopes to serve as an inspiration to others who want to pursue their dreams, "I feel like my biggest goal is to inspire people from small towns. If they want to do something, I want to encourage them to pursue it. You only have one life. If God puts something in your heart, you go for it, no matter what."
